Dear Mr. Holcomb:

Thank you very much for taking the time to meet residents of Knights Ferry and my representative last Friday afternoon. I'm pleased that your meeting was so productive. The Corps' assurance that no development will occur on the south side of the Stanislaus river in the Knights Ferry area addressed a great many of the resident's concerns. As you are aware, many in Knights Ferry and the surrounding area have relied on the Corps' assurances that development on the south side will not occur. I'm pleased that this commitment is being adhered to.

The residents were also pleased with the steps you outlined for resolving the other outstanding issues. A capacity assessment for the river and facilities between Knights Ferry and Orange Blossom, along with an analysis of alternate launch points (including the Corps maintenance facility) will address many of the residents concerns. I am personally pleased that the Corps also intends to review the contracts with the raft operators from the perspective of generating greater revenue to cover the costs of operations, facilities and any damage caused by raft usage. I'm sure your analysis will also address the issue of whether or not a ceiling should be established on the number of rafts that should be allowed on the river and also explore incentives to encourage raft use of the river on non-peak days.

The Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors' took action on February 5, 2008, to oppose the 2006 Anadromous Fish Restoration Program (AFRP) on the Stanislaus River adjacent to Knights Ferry, California. While this project may have a positive impact on the Chinook Salmon and Steelhead it would damage the fragile balance of the river's other wildlife and harmfully affect the look of this historical community.

The Board of Supervisors supports the preservation of natural habitats when they are in the best interest of all concerned. This major restoration project will negatively impact the indigenous animal and bird populations on the south side of the Stanislaus River. It will also cause a tremendous change to the look of the historical character of the Knights Ferry area.

The citizens oppose the "Restoring Side Channels Connections and Floodplains Wetland at Knight's Ferry to Benefit Juvenile Chinook Salmon and Steelhead on the Stanislaus River" project as proposed. In 1999, the citizens of this historical community received a commitment from the United States Army Corps of Engineers that no development would occur on the south side of the Stanislaus River in the Knights Ferry area. This commitment was memorialized in a letter from Congressman Condit dated June 8, 1999.

The citizens of Knights Ferry have had a constructive affiliation with the Army Corps of Engineers and look forward to working with them on projects that benefit the natural habitats of the local wildlife, the salmon and preserve the historical community.
