## **History**

The Stanislaus County Children's Council is a working group of professionals and community members dedicated to fostering collaboration and advocating for effective services for children and their families.

The Stanislaus County Children's Council was appointed by the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors on February 4, 1992.

In September 2006, the Children's Council underwent changes in its staffing and budget due to the resignation of the Executive Director and an assessment of number of employees needed to adequately run the Children's Council. The members of the Children's Council made the decision to change the Executive Director's job description and classification to the Children's Council Coordinator position.

At this time also, the Council members agreed the Community Services Agency would be the sole funding source for the Children's Council.

### **Mission**

The purpose of the Council is to advocate for and support the interests of all children and families.

### **Purpose**

Information sharing at the meetings is beneficial for strengthening collaborative between the various departments and community organizations which make up the Council membership. This allows the opportunity to expose any gaps in services and members work together through their respective agencies to fill in those gaps.

The Children's Council meets the third Wednesday of every month with the exception of July.

The Children's Council has worked to foster collaboration through various presentations at Council Meetings.

As an advocate for children’s services, the Children’s Council has written **letters in support of:**

- Senate Bill 1288 (Cedillo) – A bill that expands alcohol and other drug (AOD) treatment benefits for adolescents.
- Assembly Bill 346 (Beall) – A bill addressing the serious issues surrounding the targeting of youth for the purchase and consumption of “Alcopops” (alcoholic beverages designed and marketed for entry-level drinkers) in California.
- Assembly Bill 345 (Saldana) – Allocates the increased revenue generated by appropriate classification and taxation of alcopops to the prevention of underage drinking.
- Senate Bill 468 - A bill to reduce the prevalence of shaken baby syndrome in California.
- Center for Human Services’ Pathways Transitional Living Program Grant for 18-21 year olds.

The Children’s Council has also written **letters in opposition to:**

- Senate Bill 893 – The removal of Prop 10 funds from local county commissions to fund statewide health programs.
- Senate Bill X3 16 – Permanently abolishes First 5 commissions statewide and diverts the tobacco tax enacted Prop 10 to the state general fund. (Written and submitted by individual Council Members.)

## By-Law Changes

The following changes were made to the Children's Council By-Laws:

Executive Director was changed to Coordinator.

**November 14, 2007**

### Article III Officers

#### Section 2 – Nomination of Council Officers

“Prior to placing a name on the slate, the nominating committee shall obtain consent from each nominee. **If the Chair-elect is unable to fill the position of Chair, the nominating committee will provide another name to the Council for vote.** The candidates for Chair, Chair- Elect and Vice-Chair receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. The Chair **and Chair -elect** elected in such balloting shall have served as a member of the Council as ~~Chair-Elect~~ **Executive Committee in the prior year.**”

#### Section 3 – Terms of Officers

“(b) Term of Chair. The Chair shall have served as Chair-elect **or as a member of the Executive Committee** for the year preceding the year as Chair.”

## 2007-2008 Project

### CONDITION OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH REPORT

**Goal:** Heighten community awareness regarding the condition of children and youth in Stanislaus County.

**Objective:** Design and produce a "condition of children and youth report" providing a yearly update to the community of Stanislaus County.

In January 2008, the "Condition of Children and Youth Report 2007" was published showing the condition of children and youth in Stanislaus County for the year 2006 in the areas of child poverty, child health, child care, child abuse and neglect, juvenile crimes and delinquency and education.

A comparison report was released October 2008, the "Condition of Children and Youth Report 2008" comparing 2006 to 2007 data. The results are as follows:
