Public Hearing to Consider Planning Commission's Recommendation for Approval of General Plan Amendment #2008-05, a Minor Text Amendment to Add the Stanislaus County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan to the Safety Element of the General Plan

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# PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION: (Continued)

# DISCUSSION

The purpose of this amendment is to incorporate language in the General Plan to comply with state law requiring that local jurisdictions include a local hazard mitigation plan as part of their Safety Element.

The County's Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) is a multi-jurisdictional plan that includes the County and 48 other jurisdictions in Stanislaus County including cities and various special districts. Stanislaus County identified five natural hazards that were addressed in our Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. They are: Earthquake, Landslide, Dam Failure, Flood, and Wildfire. The HMP was approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 13, 2005.

The HMP includes a detailed risk assessment, goals, objectives and alternative mitigation actions, and a comprehensive mitigation plan and implementation strategy. The risk assessment section is a county-wide assessment of hazards. The HMP discusses jurisdiction-by-jurisdiction potential hazards, capabilities, existing plans, policies, ordinances, fiscal resources, goals, objectives, and actions, and is available for full review from the Clerk of the Board and on the Office of Emergency Services web page at: <u>http://www.scoes.info/oes.shtm</u>.

Since the adoption of the County's HMP by the Board of Supervisors, the State Legislature approved Assembly Bill (AB) 2140 adding Sections 8685.9 and 65302.6 to the Government Code. Section 65302.6 authorizes a city or county to adopt with its Safety Element a federally specified local hazard mitigation plan. It also proposes penalties on local jurisdictions that have not adopted a local hazard mitigation plan as part of the Safety Element. It would limit how much money the County may receive from the California Disaster Assistance Act in most cases to no more than 75% of the total state eligible costs unless "the County has adopted a local hazard mitigation plan... as part of the Safety Element of the General Plan."

The State Office of Emergency Services approved the County's Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan on April 29, 2005 and the plan was approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) on July 22, 2005. The Board of Supervisors adopted the Plan on December 13, 2005.

The County and 48 other jurisdictions participated in the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. Each of these 48 participating jurisdictions had their governing body formally adopt the County of Stanislaus Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, along with their individual plan, as their own Local Hazard Mitigation Plan. The County's plan serves as the umbrella plan with each individual jurisdiction's plan considered an annex. The Stanislaus County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan is incorporated into the Safety Element of the General Plan and shall be implemented as appropriate.

Modify POLICY ONE of GOAL ONE in the Safety Element as follows:

# POLICY ONE

The County will adopt (and implement as necessary) plans, <u>inclusive of the Multi-</u> Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, to minimize the impacts of <del>a</del> natural <u>and</u> <u>man-made</u> disaster<u>s</u>,

Add Implementation Measure Number 6 to POLICY ONE as follows:

6. The County has adopted a Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, and will implement and evaluate the Plan on a regular basis as necessary to comply with state and federal laws. Responsible Department: Office of Emergency Services.

# **Findings Required**

The Planning Commission met on November 20, 2008, and with very little discussion, believed that the findings above could be made and recommended that the Board of Supervisors approve General Plan Amendment Application No. 2008-05 - Minor Text Amendment to add the Stanislaus County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan to the Safety Element of the General Plan.
