Consideration of the Fiscal Year 2007-2008 Library Annual Report Page 2

DISCUSSION:

A strong local economy is essential to the quality of life for residents in Stanislaus County. The Library plays a key role in creating an attractive regional environment by fostering the love of reading and opening the door to knowledge. It operates 13 branches in communities large and small throughout the county for educational and recreational purposes, and provides equal access to all.

The Library is a family place, offering programs, materials and diverse services for children, teens, and their families. Those seeking to increase and enhance their workforce preparation skills can take advantage of Internet access, 24/7 reference services, computer classes and basic adult literacy classes or one-on-one tutoring. The Library, supported primarily by a 1/8-cent earmarked sales tax, is a great value to the community. All residents of the county contribute through regular consumer purchasing. The average Stanislaus County household contributes \$20 per year through its purchases.

The Fiscal Year 2007-2008 Library annual report contains information about the services provided by the Library and its value to the citizens in our community.

POLICY ISSUES:

Acceptance of this report addresses the Board of Supervisors' priorities of a strong local economy, efficient delivery of public services, and of effective partnerships.

Family @ the Library

- StoryTime Preschool StoryTime, designed for children ages 3-6, continues to be popular with parents and kids. Last year, 40,346 children in Stanislaus County attended 1,116 StoryTime sessions offered in all 13 branches.
- WiggleWorms This year, the Children's Department introduced WiggleWorms, an interactive early literacy storytime for children age 2 and under. WiggleWorms, which is a blend of ToddlerTime and BookBabies, uses books, music, and interaction to encourage brain development and stimulation.
- Children's Summer Reading Club Every summer, the Stanislaus County Library offers themed reading clubs for children age 12 and under. Last year, more than 7,000 children in Stanislaus County participated in "Catch the Reading Bug," chalking up more than 28,000 hours of summer reading.

- Teen Summer Reading Club Last year, more than 1,400 teens participated in the Teen Summer Reading Club. As part of the summer program, teens submitted 65 online book reviews and 461 teens attended special summer programs such as the George the Giant performances.
- Traveling Tales Traveling Tales, a free program which consists of 210 themed storytelling kits and in-depth training, is available to childcare providers who work with children 0-5 years old in Stanislaus County. This program was initially created through a grant from the Stanislaus County Children & Families Commission.

For Children & Teens

Local Celebrities Jumpstart Reading

The 2nd annual Read for the Record event drew more than 8,500 children who heard local celebrities read "The Story of Ferdinand" at Stanislaus County Libraries. Modesto Mayor Jim Ridenour, Modesto Police Department Assistant Police Chief Mike Harden, Modesto Fire Chief Jim Miguel, Stanislaus County Office of Education Superintendent Tom Changnon, and Stanislaus County Supervisors Dick Monteith and Jeff Grover read the story to eager children throughout the day at the Modesto Library, Salida Library, Turlock Library, and other locations.

Family Programs @ the Library

In addition to weekly StoryTimes, the Stanislaus County Library presents special programs for children and their families. In 2007-2008, the library offered 216 programs to delight, educate, and enrich more than 10,000 children and their families. Professional performers included Activated Storytellers, Magician Bob Kann, storyteller Tamaka, and interactive theater company Opera Piccola. Most programs are sponsored by Friends of the Library groups and the Stanislaus County Library Foundation.

Ryan's Tree Starts to Grow in Children's Library

The family and friends of Ryan Dickerson, in partnership with the Stanislaus County Library Foundation, launched an effort to build a steel art tree in his honor. Ryan, an avid reader and library supporter, died at age 18 on July 29, 2007. Ryan's Reading Tree will add beauty to the library and create a magical place for children to explore the wonders of books. Installation of the tree is slated for December 2008.

Teen Events @ the Library

During Teen Tech Week, teens were invited to Tune In @ the Library, a web-based activity to encourage them to take advantage of the library's media resources. During Teen Read Week, teens were invited to "Laugh Out Loud" at the library to encourage exploration of comedy and related library resources. The Modesto Library hosted an Open Mic Comedy Night, as well as Teen Movie Night and book discussions.

The children's programs are outstanding and the librarians are knowledgeable and enthusiastic. There are fun discoveries to be made at every visit!



Building Community

- In November 2007, Stanislaus County Library was one of five libraries to host a live videoconference with award-winning filmmaker Ken Burns, creator of the PBS World War II documentary series "The War." Library audiences had the opportunity to interact with Burns to address the war's tremendous impact on California and to learn about the making of the film.
- Last year, volunteers with the Home Delivery Service delivered 2,669 books to homebound residents in homes and facilities throughout Stanislaus County. Home Delivery Service is available to any Stanislaus County resident who is prevented from going to the library due to advanced age or disabling illness. For more information, call 209.558.7817.

Lifelong Learning

- In cooperation with the Stanislaus Literacy Center, the library offers ReadingWorks, an adult literacy program that utilizes volunteers from the community to help other adults improve their reading, spelling, and basic math skills. Last year, 117 volunteer tutors provided one-on-one tutoring to 128 students; 36 new tutors were trained. To learn more about volunteering as a tutor or getting help with reading, call 209.558.4505.
- The library offers a computer skills training program, Bridges to Technology, which last year trained a total of 794 students during 235 small group classes on Basic Computer Skills, MS Publisher, Word, and more. 

- The Modesto Library's Foundation Center database is a searchable resource of grant listings for teachers, students, or nonprofit groups searching for funding. Using this resource, Friends for Sophia's Dog Park—a local organization—was able to secure thousands in grant funding for a dog park in Patterson.






