Approval of a Letter of Support for Funding for the San Joaquin River National Wildlife Refuge for Land Acquisition

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

Authorize the Chairman to sign a letter of support for funding for the San Joaquin River National Wildlife Refuge for land acquisition.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The House of Representatives has included \$2 million in funding for the San Joaquin River National Wildlife Refuge. If supported in the Senate and ultimately approved, the San Joaquin region would receive \$2 million to acquire land for inclusion in the San Joaquin River National Wildlife Refuge. There is no fiscal impact to Stanislaus County associated with this item.

DISCUSSION:

The acquisition of land for inclusion in the San Joaquin River National Wildlife Refuge is expected to protect native grasslands and wetlands that are essential for long-term survival of the Aleutian Canada goose. It will also protect a large piece of riparian habitat valuable to a variety of wildlife species. Congressman Dennis Cardoza has been a strong advocate for the preservation of this critical habitat and has requested County support for this funding proposal. The project cooperators include the State of California CALFED Bay Delta Grant Program.

If approved, funds would be used to acquire two (2) tracts consisting of approximately 213 acres. These properties are predominantly native, irrigated pasture and will be protected by means of a perpetual conservation easement. The biggest threat to the property is residential development and the conversion from grasslands and wetlands habitat to croplands, orchards, or dairy operations that will provide little or no benefit to wildlife. The acquisition of these properties will provide long term viability to the grassland and wetland ecosystem as well as provide a safe haven for migratory birds and other wildlife species.

The interest to be acquired in the 213 acres is a perpetual conservation easement. For this reason there will be little to no long-term management costs associated with this acquisition.

POLICY ISSUES:

The funding proposal, if approved will provide resources that will help to protect native grasslands and wetlands essential to the long term survival of the Aleutian Canada goose. This action is consistent with the Board's priority of a well planned infrastructure system.
