DISCUSSION:

The Stanislaus County Emergency Operations Plan and Emergency Functions are being submitted to the Board of Supervisors for final adoption.

At its inaugural meeting on March 18, 2010, the combined Stanislaus County/City Disaster Council approved as to form the Stanislaus County Emergency Operations Plan and, using the Decision Process for Emergency Management, recommended its adoption by the Stanislaus County Board of Supervisors.

On January 20, 2011, the Disaster Council approved as to form the ten Emergency Functions that are included in the Emergency Operations Plan.

The Stanislaus County Emergency Operations Plan addresses the planned response to extraordinary emergency situations associated with natural or human caused disasters, technological incidents, and national security emergencies in or affecting the County of Stanislaus.

The plan accomplishes the following:

- Uses as its foundation, the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) to provide the functional components and concepts.
- Complies with and integrates the National Incident Management System (NIMS)
 concepts related to local government emergency management, including
 coordination with Federal, State and Local agencies and jurisdictions as well as
 non-governmental entities.
- Identifies the policies, responsibilities and procedures required to protect the health and safety of Stanislaus County communities, public and private property and the environmental effects of natural and technological emergencies and disasters.
- Establishes the operational concepts and procedures associated with Initial Response Operations (field response) to emergencies, the Expanded Response Operations (County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activities) and the recovery process.

The Emergency Operations Plan is designed to establish the framework for the implementation of the California Standardized Emergency System (SEMS) for Stanislaus County which was adopted by the Board in 1997. It is intended to facilitate multi-agency and multi-jurisdictional coordination, particularly between Stanislaus

County and local governments, including special districts and state agencies, in emergency operations.

This plan is primarily operational in design. It serves a secondary use as a planning reference. Departments within the County of Stanislaus and local governments who have roles and responsibilities identified by this plan are encouraged to develop emergency operations plans, detailed Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs), and emergency response checklists based on the provisions of this plan. This plan will be used in conjunction with the State Emergency Plan and will be the model for the Emergency Operations Plans currently being written for the nine cities in Stanislaus County.

The plan is designed to guide the reader or user through each phase of an emergency: mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery. It consists of the Basic Plan, which addresses generic emergency preparedness and response activities, as well as including specific annexes designed to address identified threats and/or situations that may occur in Stanislaus County.

A new component to the Emergency Operations Plan is the inclusion of the Emergency Functions. Designed to coordinate with the State of California's Emergency Functions and FEMA's Emergency Support Functions, the County's Emergency Functions identify County Departments and Agencies as well as other stakeholders whose daily operations are crucial to the ability of the County to mitigate, prepare, respond and recover from any emergency. Each Emergency Function at the County level identifies primary and supporting agencies, essential functions, concept of operations and initial actions in the event of an emergency or disaster.

The emergency authorities for conducting and/or supporting emergency operations are provided for by a number of federal, state and local laws and ordinances. The Chief Executive Officer will direct the emergency management organization, serving as the Director of the Office of Emergency Services. In this role, the Director is responsible for implementing the Emergency Operations Plan. The County Office of Emergency Services/Fire Warden led the development of this plan. It was developed in conjunction with representatives of key County departments and other agencies, including the Sheriff, Public Works, Public Health, Environmental Resources, the Ag Commissioner, Community Services Agency, Behavioral Health and Recovery Services, SR -911, and Animal Services.

Completion of this plan and adoption by the Board of Supervisors is a key component in assuring the health and safety of our community. It also ensures that in the event of any natural or man-made disaster, the County would be eligible for emergency relief funding from the State and/or Federal Government.


STAFFING IMPACT:





DECISION PROCESS FOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT



PLAN, PROJECT, POLICY, OR PROCEDURE SUBMITTED FOR REVIEW

- . An agency within the Operational Area Council submits a plan, project, policy, or procedure for review
- Plans can be submitted to either the Operational Area Council or the Disaster Council
- . Plans are usually submitted to the Operational Area Council first
- . Operational Area Council reviews, approves, and forwards to the Disaster Council for action



PLAN, PROJECT, POLICY, OR PROCEDURE CATEGORIZED BY THE OPERATIONAL AREA COORDINATOR

- . DEVELOPMENTAL—A new plan, or modification of, an existing emergency or disaster related plan
- . POLICY/PROCEDURAL—Issue that affects the management and/or operations of emergency response
- . INFORMATIONAL—Issue of general interest that does not require action by the Disaster Council



PLAN, PROJECT, POLICY, OR PROCEDURE SUB-CATEGORIZED BY THE OPERATIONAL AREA COUNCIL

- TASK FORCE GROUP—Formed to provide functional expertise for a specific project & then disbanded
- SPECIALIST GROUP—Program specific group that already exists, such as schools or public health



REVIEW/APPROVAL/RECOMMENDATION FOR ADOPTION

- Task Force/Specialist Group reviews and forwards back to the Operational Area Council for approval
- Operational Area Council votes to approve as to form/content and forwards to Disaster Council
- Disaster Council votes to approve as to form/content and recommends adoption by governing agency



FINAL ADOPTION

- . Governing agency of that plan, project, or policy—Board of Supervisors or City Council votes to adopt
- · Plan, project, or policy, formally adopted
- . Governing body is assured it is uniform and ICS, SEMS, NIMS, and HSPD 5 & 8 compliant
