California voters passed Proposition 63, the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA), in November 2004 to expand and improve mental health services in the state. The goal is to transform the mental health system and improve the quality of life for Californians living with a mental illness.

MHSA is made up of 5 components:

- Community Services and Support (CSS)
- Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI)
- Workforce Education and Training (WET)
- Capital Facilities and Technological Needs (CF/TN)
- Innovation (INN)

Prevention & Early Intervention is rooted in working within the county's most underserved/unserved, cultural and geographical communities with a strong focus of helping reduce risk factors for developing a potentially serious mental illness. Additionally, PEI is meant to help create timely access and linkages to treatment services when necessary to prevent mental health from becoming severe and disabling. A few key points and updates regarding Prevention & Early Intervention include the following:

- PEI programs must provide its services in a convenient, accessible, acceptable, non-stigmatizing, culturally appropriate settings. These settings include: *schools, family resource centers, places of worship, primary healthcare, shelters etc.*
- Services shall be designed, implemented and promoted using non-stigmatizing and non-discriminatory strategies including honoring faith, cultural practices, spirituality and community based peer support models.
- PEI is required to serve all age groups.
- *Prevention* is defined as: a set of related activities to reduce risk factors and build protective factors.
- *Early Intervention* is defined as: treatment and other services and interventions including relapse prevention to address and promote recovery including reducing (suicide, incarcerations, school failure or dropout, homelessness and removal of children from their home).

The majority of PEI work is conducted in partnership with community based partnering agencies. Stanislaus County BHRS-PEI has seen great success in working closely with community members, and partnering agencies. One of the many programs that has been successful due to its innovative, cultural approach; and now, also identified as a promising practice is the:

RAIZ (Realizando Alianza y Inspirando Sabiduría) PROMOTORES MENTAL HEALTH PREVENTION PROGRAM

The RAIZ Promotores Mental Health Prevention Program consists of twelve full time individuals, contracted under various non-profit agencies targeted at reaching the Spanish speaking community in Stanislaus County. Promotores provide receive specialized mental health training to provide support through a community engagement model known as Community Health Workers. Promotores are trusted individuals that facilitate conversations with community members in their own language, honor culture and aim to improve individual and community well-being. Similarly, Promotores support the development of healthy relationships, leadership skills, and mental and emotional health to those they serve through:

- Community Support Groups
- Promoting Mental Health,
- Providing Access and linkage
- Conduct training
- Promote Wellness
