A Motion was made to approve the PFF Committee Meeting Minutes from August 21, 2025. Motion: Valencia | Second: Barnes | Unanimous (5 | 0) | Abstain:(0)

2. The committee discussed a request from the General Services Agency (GSA) to expand the Facilities Maintenance Shop located at 250 East Hackett Road in Modesto. The existing facility, built in the 1990s, houses 28 employees and serves over 2.5 million square feet of County space. Due to limited workspace, insufficient office and breakroom areas, and only one non-ADA-compliant restroom, GSA proposes to convert an existing storage bay into additional office and support areas. The project includes creating offices for the Maintenance and Facilities Manager and Supervisors, a conference room, an ADA-compliant restroom, and a new breakroom.

The total project cost is estimated at \$700,000. GSA is requesting \$396,900 (56.7%) in Public Facilities Fees (PFF) funding, with the difference funded by GSA's Facilities Maintenance Stanislaus County Public Facilities Fees Committee Meeting Minutes – October 16, 2025

Fund. The project qualifies for PFF "Other Facilities" funding as outlined in the 2019 Willdan Financial Services Report.

The Committee confirmed that since the shop was built in the 1990s, the request would qualify at the higher percent of need attributable to growth, which is 56.7%. The Committee requested that the funds in 6408 be exhausted, with the remaining balance coming from 2408.

A motion was made to approve the request from the General Services Agency for the Maintenance Shop improvements with the notation as to why the project qualified at the higher attributable growth percentage.

Valencia abstained as he presented the item.

Inacio declared that her brother works out of the GSA Maintenance Shop and Counsel confirmed there was no conflict but asked to note the disclosure.

3. The committee heard a presentation from the General Services Agency (GSA) which provided an update on compliance with the California Air Resources Board (CARB) Advance Clean Fleet regulation, which requires public agencies to transition to Zero Emission Vehicles (ZEV). Beginning in 2024, 50% of new vehicles weighing over 8,500 pounds must be ZEVs, increasing to 100% by 2027, with full electrification by 2035. Noncompliance may result in penalties of up to \$10,000 per vehicle per day. To prepare for this mandate, GSA and Public Works are procuring compliant vehicles and planning for charging infrastructure to support fleet conversion.

GSA's proposed project includes installing 350kw high-capacity electric vehicle chargers, the the highest available, to serve heavy-duty County vehicles. Two initial sites are planned: the Fleet Maintenance Shop (located on Hackett) and a second location at 800 Scenic Avenue near Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS). The project is estimated to cost \$1,450,000, with \$822,150 (56.7%) requested from Public Facilities Fees (PFF).

A \$232,000 federal grant has been secured to help fund the first site, with the balance to be covered by Fleet Maintenance Fund Balance or other grant sources. Phase I is expected to begin in early 2026, followed by Phase II in late 2026 through early 2027.

The Committee confirmed that since the shop was built in the 1990s, the request would qualify at the higher percent of need attributable to growth, which is 56.7%. The sites where the chargers will be installed were all built in the 1990s, if not, earlier.

A motion was made to approve the request from GSA Agency to use \$\$822,150 for the EV chargers from the "Other Facilities" fund, 2408.

Valencia abstained as he presented the item.

4. The committee discussed the results of an audit completed by Stanislaus Workforce Development on S2A Modulars – a business that requested reduced development fees under the Public Facilities Fees Large Industrial Incentive Program.

Based on the audit results, the business did not meet all the goals set but the Committee needed more information to determine the amount to be reimbursed to the business on fees it already has paid. Staff will follow up with Workforce Development and input the updated figures into the original spreadsheet to obtain an updated figure.

SUBJECT: PUBLIC FACILITIES FEE INCENTIVE AUDIT

The purpose of this report is to provide the Public Facilities Fees (PFF) Large Industrial Incentive Program audit results for S2A Modular 2, LLC (S2A Modular). The audit was conducted to verify the materialization of the assumptions made in the application by S2A Modular that was approved at the Public Facilities Fees Committee meeting on June 15, 2023. This audit, conducted by Stanislaus County Workforce Development, is consistent with the PFF Large Industrial Incentive program guidelines.

PUBLIC FACILITIES FEES LARGE INDUSTRIAL INCENTIVE PROGRAM:

The large Industrial Investment Incentive Program (the "Program") was developed to assist the facilitation of job creation in Stanislaus County in the industrial sector. The incentive applies a discount on the amount of fees paid based on a sliding scale, with the maximum discount reaching 50% in the Manufacturing sector and up to 60% in the Warehouse and Distribution sectors.

PROJECT APPLICANT:

S2A Modular planned a factory to manufacture modular housing with a projected total capital investment of \$30 million, a project size of 100,050 square feet of factory space, and the creation of 25 new jobs at an average hourly wage of \$30.98. S2A Modular completed construction and started production at its manufacturing plant in Patterson, CA on January 1, 2022.

FINDINGS AT YEAR ONE:

S2A Modular provided documentation that showed the total capital investment at the end of year one was \$23,417,541.63. This equates to 78% of the promised \$30 million as stated in the application. S2A Modular reached the \$30 million capital investment by April 2025, however, at the end of year one they fell short of their intended goal.

By the end of year one, S2A Modular created 13 new jobs at the required minimum of 35 hours per week, which is 52% of the 25 jobs promised. A total of 31 jobs were created (29 hourly employees and 2 management positions), but the majority were fewer than the 35 hours. The







newly generated jobs included foreman, general construction, administration, maintenance, electrical, production, quality inspector, and janitor.

The calculated average hourly wage for all 29 on-site employees (including those with fewer than 35 hours per week, but excluding management), was \$26.38, which equates to 85% of the promised \$30.98. During the first year, the hourly wages ranged from \$22 to \$30 per hour with a median wage of \$26 per hour. With only 4 employees earning \$30 per hour, an average hourly wage of \$30.98 was not achievable. California's minimum wage in 2022 was \$15 per hour for employers with 25 or more employees. S2A Modular's \$26.38 average hourly wage was 76% above the State's \$15 minimum wage.*

INDIRECT ECONOMIC BENEFIT:

Economic benefits go beyond the direct initial job generation that occurs with a new business or development. To estimate the impact of the new manufacturing plant we have included the results of an impact scenario model by Lightcast. The estimated economic impact includes initial, direct, indirect, and induced effects. According to Lightcast, the initial effect on earnings by the addition of 13 jobs is \$799,209. The direct effect which is due to inter-industry effects is \$159,870, which represents the first round of impacts by the new industry. The indirect effect, which is \$41,509, reflects the subsequent ripple effect in further supply chains resulting from the direct change. The induced effects reflect the impact of the initial, direct, and indirect changes. Induced effects enter the economy as employees spend their paychecks in the region, businesses invest to grow their operations, and the government spends more to support the changes. The induced effect is estimated by the impact scenario to be \$171,159 in additional earnings above the initial job creation (attachment 1).

For the initial 13 jobs created at S2A Modular, an estimated additional 6 support jobs were added to the local economy. The initial, direct, indirect, and induced jobs equated to a total of 19 jobs for the region. The Lightcast impact scenario estimates the local, State, and Federal taxes generated on production and imports for the added jobs to be \$82,459.

SUMMARY:

S2A Modular's capital investment was less than planned, job creation was half of what was stated in the application, and the average hourly wage fell short of their goal. However, the average hourly wage was substantially higher than the minimum wage at the time, and the factory generated some additional benefits to the community including the Green Factor and perhaps the Community Need bonus factors described in the Program.

S2A Modular stated the Patterson factory was the first and only Net Zero factory in the United States. During our audit visit to the factory, S2A Modular explained that all of their power needs were met by a Tesla Mega Pack and solar panels. In addition, the building has a transparent roof which reduces the need for lighting during daylight hours. By our observation, S2A Modular qualifies for the Green Factor Bonus.





S2A Modular claims to meet the Community Need bonus factor for the Program by building affordable housing. The Patterson factory produces modular units that can be made into a variety of structures including accessory dwelling units (ADUs), single family residences, tiny homes, as well as commercial buildings. While a need for affordable housing exists, we were unable to determine whether S2A Modular fulfilled that need within the first year.

*Percentage change was calculated by subtracting \$15 from \$26.38, then dividing \$11.38 by \$15 and multiplying by 100, which yields 75.8667% change or increase.

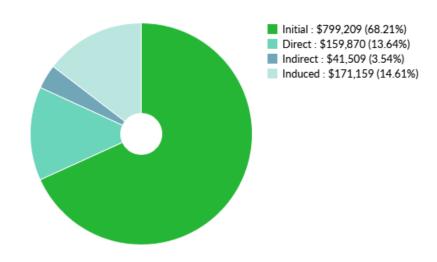

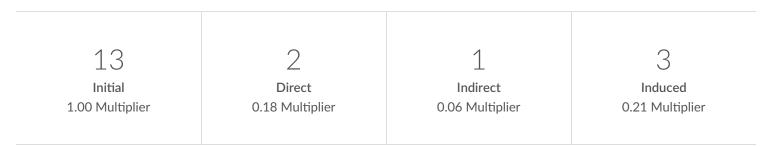

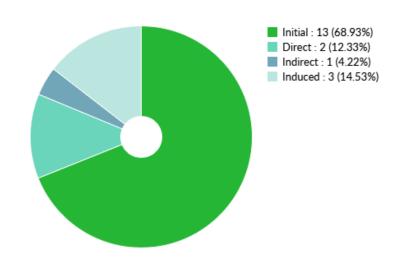

Based on the eligible funding percentage of **55.01%**, the total allowable PFF contribution is **\$5,495,499**. Stanislaus County has already received and rolled forward **\$3,960,720** in previously approved PFF funds for this project. Therefore, the County is now requesting an **additional allocation of \$1,534,779** from Fund 2402 to fully fund the PFF-eligible portion of the project.

This project remains critical to ensuring compliance with state regulations, supporting the health and safety of incarcerated individuals, and maintaining the operational integrity of the County's detention facilities.

In 1987 California adopted the Mitigation Fee Act which allowed local governments to collect impact fees related to construction and provided the requirements for establishing, collecting, and reporting of impact fees. The Mitigation Fee Act is part of the California Government Code Sections 66000 through 66008.

On December 19, 1989, the Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No. 89-1724, which established a public facilities fee program for development in Stanislaus County. Public Facilities Fees (PFF) are collected on building permits for new developments in the County and are expended only for purposes specifically identified in the County's PFF program and are authorized by the Board of Supervisors prior to distribution. PFF are collected to ensure that new development supports the capital costs associated with growth. Government Code Section 66006 requires an annual report of the PFF funds.

Per Government Code Section 66001(d), funds which have accumulated for a period of five years or longer must be identified for a specific purpose.

Fiscal Year 2025 Financial Activity Summary

The PFF program is an important component of funding growth-related capital improvements within Stanislaus County. Fees collected in Fiscal Year 2025 for PFF and Planned Development Areas were \$7 million, a 27% decrease compared with the prior fiscal year. The decline in PFF fees can be attributed to an increase in fee deferrals, particularly in the City of Modesto, in Fiscal Year 2025 and an unusually high level of fee collections in Fiscal Year 2024 in the City of Riverbank, which has since normalized in Fiscal Year 2025. Fees are collected based on the schedule in effect at the time the development agreement was drafted or when the building permit is issued if no development agreement exists.

Fiscal Year 2025 disbursements from the PFF program were \$20.2 million, a 219% increase compared to prior fiscal year. This increase is due to large distributions brought on by work proceeding on the North County Corridor Phase 1 Project and several improvements to the Public Safety Center and Sheriff's training spaces. Of the \$20.2 million, 61%, or \$12.3 million, was spent on the North County Corridor Phase 1 Project. Detail of the disbursements, including the various projects and amounts funded by PFF, is outlined in the PFF Distributions Report section.

An administrative charge is calculated as part of the fee and is available to offset the costs of administering the program. Prior to 2010, the administrative charge was 2.5% of PFF collected. From 2010 through June 30, 2018 the administrative charge was set at 1%. Effective June 30, 2018, the administrative charge is set at 2% of the total PFF charged. Administrative Fees retained by the cities for Fiscal Year 2025 totaled \$20,984. Cities that collect and remit PFF to the County are allowed to keep 1% of the total PFF collected for helping to administer the PFF program. The administrative fees collected for Fiscal Year 2025 were \$117,161, a 13% decrease compared to prior fiscal year comparable with the overall fee revenue decrease. Funds withdrawn for administering the PFF program during Fiscal Year 2025 were \$196,311, a 140% increase due to the purchase of updated permitting software. The administrative fee distributions are displayed in the PFF Distributions Report section.

The accumulated cash balance of all PFF excluding the balance of administrative fees is \$34.4 and Planned Development Fees is \$345,000 as of June 30, 2025 for a combined total of \$34.7 million. Per Government code section 66001(d) the County is required to identify the purpose to which the accumulated cash balance is to be used. A plan for the use of the accumulated cash balance, as well as total estimated project costs and estimated project start dates, can be found on the Public Facilities Fees Plan for Accumulated Funds section of this report.

Fiscal Year 2025 Program Activity

For Fiscal Year 2025 the PFF program received and approved requests for deferral on collection on 705 housing units and 25 commercial projects and received and approved requests for exemption of fees on 55 housing units and 25 commercial projects. Deferrals and exemptions were approved under the administrative authority of the Planning and Community Development Department. Deferred fees for Fiscal Year 2025 amounted to \$5,106,088. Additionally, the PFF Committee received and approved a request from Stanislaus Regional Housing Authority to waive PFF in the amount of \$241,230 for 33 single family homes; a request from Self Help Enterprises to waive PFF in the amount of \$577,490 for 79 single family homes; a request from UP Modesto Homekey to waive PFF in the amount of \$394,740 for the Jenny's place project, which includes 54 low-income housing units; and a request from Modesto Gospel Mission to waive PFF in the amount of \$95,030 for 13 prefabricated sleeping units to reduce homelessness. These requests, totaling \$1,308,490, were approved by the PFF Committee under the PFF Committee's authority to waive PFF for low-income housing.

Additionally, the PFF Committee received and approved a request from Joe M. Gomes & Sons, Inc to waive PFF in the amount of \$124,000 for the relocation of fuel dispensers on their facility. PFF was applied because the relocation of the fuel dispensers would move the fuel dispensers onto a different parcel which would cause tracking challenges for the County. Since PFF had previously been paid on the fuel dispenser upon the original construction and installation, the PFF Committee approved the request to waive PFF on the fuel dispensers contingent upon the merging of the two properties that the facility sits on in order to facilitate the County's ability to track PFF payments on development.

Additional Notes and References

Planned Development Fees are collected as part of planned development agreements in specified areas within the County. While Planned Development Fees are not part of the County's PFF program, Planned Development Fees are still subject to reporting under the Mitigation Fee act and are included in the PFF annual report to consolidate reporting requirements.

California Government Code Section 66002 states that local agencies that have developed a fee program may adopt a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) indicating the approximate location, size, and timing of projects, plus an estimate for the cost of all facilities or improvements to be financed by fees. The County produces an annual rolling five-year CIP, which is evaluated and scored based each project's critical need, strategic priority, master planning efforts, funding opportunities, impact to the budget, and customer experience.

Administrative Fees / Unincorporated Admin Fees

The administrative charge funds costs that include: (1) a standard overhead charge applied to all County programs for legal, accounting, and other departmental and County wide administrative support, (2) capital planning and programming associated with the share of projects funded by the impact fee, and (3) impact fee program administrative costs including revenue collection, revenue and cost accounting mandated public reporting, and fee justification analyses. The administrative charge can be used for costs related to the preparation and management of capital improvement project documents whose tasks clearly tie to facilities required to accommodate growth, including master facility planning documents.

Animal Services

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of animal control facilities. The fee is charged County wide, except in the cities of Turlock, Oakdale, Newman, and Riverbank which maintain municipal animal control facilities. The County will use fee revenues to fund the animal services shelter expansion project and any related vehicles and equipment.

Atlas Highway 108/120

The purpose of this fee is for improvements at the Atlas Rd and Highway 108/120 intersection for deceleration, acceleration, and turning lanes.

Behavioral Health

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of behavioral health facilities. The fee will be charged County wide to both residential and nonresidential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand behavioral health facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

City/County Roads

The purpose of this fee is to ensure new growth funds its fair share of County roads and traffic improvements outside city boundaries that have not been accounted for as major inter-city routes or as urban sphere road improvements financed through a city's traffic fee program. This fee was discontinued in the 2010 RTIF update.

Criminal Justice / Justice

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of criminal justice facilities. The fee will be charged County wide to both residential and nonresidential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand criminal justice facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

<u>Crows Landing Industrial Business Park (CLIBP) Traffic Facilities</u>

The purpose of this fee is to fund the improvements related to the impact of nonresidential development of the CLIBP.

CLIBP Water Facilities

The purpose of this fee is to fund the improvements related to the need for backbone water infrastructure to accommodate growth within the CLIBP. The need for water facilities improvements is based on the water demand placed on the system by development.

CLIBP Wastewater Facilities

The purpose of this fee is to fund the improvements related to the need for backbone wastewater infrastructure to accommodate growth within the CLIBP.

CLIBP Storm Drain Facilities

The purpose of this fee is to fund growth related to storm drain facilities within the CLIBP.

Detention

The purpose of the fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of planned County wide detention facilities. County wide detention refers to the adult and youth incarceration facilities and services provided by the County, in both incorporated and unincorporated areas. The fee will be charged County wide to both residential and nonresidential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand detention facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development. This fee replaced the Jails fee in the 2003 Public Facilities Fees Program update.

Developer Fees CSA-10

The purpose of this fee is to fund development and capital improvement of the park sites in the Salida Planned Community.

Emergency Services

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of emergency service facilities. The fee is charged County wide to both residential and nonresidential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand emergency services facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development. This fee replaced the Fire Warden fee in the 2003 Public Facilities Fees Program update.

Fire Warden

The purpose of this fee is to support future growth in the County in relation to fire prevention, suppression, training, investigation, and administrative assistance services. This fee was discontinued in the 2003 Public Facilities Fees Program update and replaced by the Emergency Services fee.

Health / Public Health

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of health facilities. The fee will be charged County wide to both residential and nonresidential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand health facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

Highway 120/Dillwood

This developer fee is part of the Hillsborough Estates Development Project to fund improvements at the Dillwood Rd and Highway 108/120 intersection for deceleration, acceleration, and turning lanes.

Information Technology

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of information technology needs and is charged County wide. Information technology to be funded by this fee includes major software licenses and related items. The County would use fee revenues to expand information technology equipment to serve new development.

<u>Jails</u>

The purpose of this fee is to provide expansion County wide for the Sheriff's coroner, public administrator, civil division, bailiff, and jails divisions. This fee was discontinued in the 2003 Public Facilities Fees Program update and replaced by the Detention fee.

Keyes Interchange

The purpose of this fee is for ramp improvements at the SR99 and Keyes Road Interchange.

Library

The purpose of this fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of library facilities. The fee will be charged County wide to all new residential development. The County will use fee revenues to expand library facilities, including collections and equipment, to serve new development.

McHenry/Charity Turnsignal

The purpose of this fee is to pay for the fair share of traffic improvements for the intersection of McHenry Ave and Charity Way.

Neighborhood Parks

The purpose of the neighborhood park facilities fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of local parks in the unincorporated communities. New development in the unincorporated area of the County will pay the "Neighborhood Parks" component of the fee. The County will use fee revenues to expand park facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

Outpatient

The purpose of this fee is to fund future expansion of out-patient care for new residents and new workers throughout the County. This fee was discontinued in the 2003 Public Facilities Fees Program update.

Other Facilities / Unincorporated- Other Facilities

This fee addresses the need for other County facilities needed to serve projected development including office space, shop space, and related equipment. The fee is charged County wide. Some facilities serve either the unincorporated area almost exclusively (public works facilities) or have some functions that are County wide and others that exclusively serve the unincorporated area (e.g., some County planning functions). The County will use fee revenues to expand other County facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

Regional Parks / Parks

The purpose of the park facilities fee is to ensure that new development funds its fair share of parks and open space facilities and is charged County wide. The County will use fee revenues to expand park facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.

Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF)

The RTIF program collects impact fees from new development County wide, both in cities and the unincorporated area, to fund the regional transportation facilities required to accommodate growth. The RTIF is charged to new development at the same rate County wide including in incorporated cities.

Salida Roads

The purpose of this fee is to collect for improvement of Roads in the Salida Planned Community.

Sheriff

This addresses the funding need for proposed sheriff patrol and investigation facilities in the unincorporated areas of Stanislaus County. The sheriff patrol and investigation facilities fee is only charged in the unincorporated areas of the County. Fee revenue will be spent on expanding facilities, including vehicles and equipment, to serve new development.
