Emergency Solutions Grants Program

- Stanislaus County annually receives Emergency Solutions Grant Program (ESG) federal funding from U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to administer to eligible non-profit organizations in Stanislaus County
- ESG funding provides shelter and services to help persons experiencing homelessness or persons at-risk of homelessness regain housing stability with the following components:
 - Emergency Shelter (ES)
 - Homeless Prevention (HP)
 - Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)
 - Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)

ESG Purpose

Engage homeless individuals and families living on the street	Improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families	Help operate shelters
Provide essential	Rapidly re-house	Prevent families and

Housing First

- HUD strongly encourages ESG subrecipients to adopt Housing First Practices and remove unnecessary barriers to receiving assistance.
- Housing First is a proven approach in which all people experiencing homelessness are believed to be housing ready and are provided with permanent housing immediately and with few to no preconditions, behavioral contingencies, or barriers.
- Examples of common barriers imposed on participants outside of Housing First practices include:
 - Having too little or no income
 - · Active or history of substance abuse
 - Having criminal histories
 - Fleeing domestic violence

Program Service Area



Stanislaus Urban County

Grant applications must identify the service area for their program.

Shelters that are not based in the Stanislaus Urban County service area may still apply for funding as long as they serve all homeless individuals within the County that they have the capacity to assist.

ESG Regulations

100% Matching Funding

Required participation in HMIS and Coordinated Entry

30% or below AMI, RRH re-certify after 12 months

Specific to RRH* & HP:

- •Termination Procedures
- Case Management
- Habitability Standards
- •FMR and Rent Reasonableness Calculations
- Rental agreement for property manager/landlord
- •Rental agreement or lease in client's name
- Landlord/property owner agreement with agency

Income verification is required for Homeless Assistance at intake and at annual reassessment, not upon program entry

Client Data

Agency is required to obtain, update, and maintain individual client files documenting program eligibility

Agency is required to collect statistical data

ESG Available Funding

Fiscal Year 2025 ESG Allocation Estimate: \$200,000

- Emergency Shelter Activities
 - \$120,000 Maximum Amount
- Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing
 - \$80,000 Estimated Minimum Available
 - No Cap on Award Request
- HMIS
 - \$15,000 Maximum Amount

- All applications are screened for completeness and eligibility to make sure the applicants meet the basic ESG criteria.
- Application submission deadline is July 8, 2025, 5:00 p.m.

Panel Presentations, Scoring Criteria and Ranking Process

Grant Application Process

- Applicants schedule presentations
- Presentations will be conducted via Zoom
- Applicants will have the opportunity to give a 15-minute presentation about the proposal to the Grant Review Panel
- Applicants will have an opportunity to answer questions presented by the Grant Review Panel

Grant Review Panel

- ESG Grant Review Panel One representative from the local CoC, one County representative and one city representative from each of the seven Stanislaus Urban County City members.
- County Staff provides the Grant Review Panel training for scoring criteria and evaluation process via Zoom.
- Review and scoring will be completed through the Neighborly Participant Portal.
- The Grant Review Panel will have the opportunity to ask the applicant questions about the proposal.
