GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

ESG Program Overview:

ESG provides shelter and services to help persons experiencing homelessness or persons at-risk of homelessness regain housing stability.

The federal ESG program is governed by 24 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Parts 91 and 576. HUD's ESG Program information is available online: <https://www.hudexchange.info/programs/esg/>.

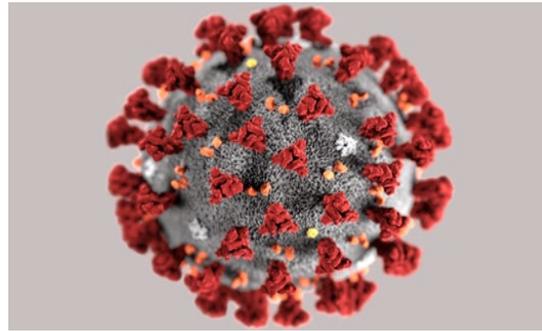

GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

ESG CARES Act Funding:

ESG-CV funds must be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus, among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homeless assistance and to support additional homeless assistance and homelessness prevention activities to mitigate the impacts created by coronavirus. (*ESG-CV Notice*)



GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

HCD released CA-ESG CV2 NOFA on October 2, 2020. As an Administrative Entity Stanislaus County was awarded \$22,767,898 to prepare for, prevent, and respond to COVID-19.

A Two Phase funding Approach: This NOFA addresses Emergency Shelter Operations funding related to the Phase One option: \$10,000,000 for Emergency Shelter Operations based on a 3 tier funding system approved by the CSOC to be awarded to existing eligible emergency shelters CSOC as outlined in the December 17, 2020 CSOC Memo available online at: [DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT \(csocstan.com\)](https://www.csocstan.com/department-of-planning-and-community-development)

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

EMERGENCY SHELTER

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Case Management

- Use of centralized/coordinated assessment system;
- Evaluation, verifying/documenting eligibility;
- Counseling;
- Developing/securing/coordinating services;
- Obtaining Federal, State, and local benefits;
- Monitoring/evaluating participant progress;
- Information and referrals to other providers;
- Ongoing risk assessment and safety planning with victims of domestic violence;
- Individualized housing/service plan to stability



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Child Care

- Child Care costs
- Meals/Snacks
- Cost of developmental activities
 - Children under 13 or children with disabilities under 18



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Education

Education, when necessary to obtain/maintain housing: – Screening, assessment, and testing;

– Individual or group instruction;

– Tutoring;

– Provision of books, supplies, and instructional materials;

– Counseling



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Employment/Training

- Employment and Training
 - Classroom, online, and/or computer instruction
 - On-the-job instruction
 - Assistance in securing employment, acquiring learning skills, increasing earning potential
 - Employment screening, assessment, or testing
 - Structured job skills and job-seeking skills
 - Special training and tutoring, including literacy training and prevocational training
 - Books and instructional material
 - Counseling or job coaching



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Outpatient Health Services

- Available to the extent that is unavailable within the community:
 - Assessing and developing treatment plan
 - Assisting in understanding health needs
 - Medical treatment, preventive medical care, health maintenance services
 - Medication and follow-up services
 - Preventive and non-cosmetic dental care



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Legal Services

- Legal Services:
 - Hourly fees for legal advice
 - Preparation for trial
 - Provision of legal advice
 - Representation at hearings
 - Counseling
 - Filing fees and court costs



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Life Skills Training

- Life Skills Training:
 - Budgeting resources
 - Managing money
 - Managing a household
 - Resolving conflict
 - Shopping for food and needed items
 - Improving nutrition
 - Using public transportation
 - Parenting



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Mental Health Services

- Licensed medical professionals provide clients at emergency shelter the following when services are unavailable/inaccessible:
 - Crisis interventions,
 - The prescription of psychotropic medications,
 - Explanation about the use management of medications,
 - Combinations of therapeutic approaches to address multiple problems



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Substance Abuse Treatments

- Licensed or certified professionals provide treatment to prevent, reduce,

eliminate, or deter relapse:

- Client intake and assessment
- Outpatient treatment for up to thirty (30) days
- Group and individual counseling
- Drug testing



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Transportation

- Used by program participants to and from medical care, employment,

child care, or other facilities:

– Participants travel on public transit/costs of staff to accompany participants on public

transportation

– Mileage for staff to visit participants

– Purchasing/leasing vehicle for staff use in conducting outreach activities



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WORKSHOP

ESG Eligible Uses

Emergency Shelter- Essential Services – Services Special Populations

- Essential services tailored for:
 - Homeless youth
 - Victims of Domestic Violence & related crimes/threats
 - People living with HIV/AIDS

GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

Notable elements regarding the use of CA-ESG CV2 funding include:

- Resources may only be used to cover allowable costs that are associated with preventing, preparing for, and responding to COVID-19.
- These funds are exempt from the ESG match requirements.
- No funds may be used to require people experiencing homelessness to receive treatment or any other prerequisite activity as a condition for receiving shelter, housing, or other services.

GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

Duplication of Benefits:

Controls to avoid any duplication of benefits by assurance, through a Duplication of Benefits Analysis, that the applicant is not receiving financial assistance from other sources for the expenses listed in the application AND demonstrating the ability to determine a client's needs are not met from other funding sources.

(See HUD's guidance on Duplication of Benefits regulations.)

GRANT TECHNICAL WORKSHOP

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

Use of all funding is required to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to limit the potential environmental impacts of a project. Activities funded under the ESG Program are subject to the environmental review regulations at 24 Code of Federal Regulations part 58 before any expenditure of funding occurs.

Late applications submittals will not be accepted.

Any applications received after the due date will not be considered for funding.

Applicants must answer every question.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS OVERVIEW

- ▶ Only complete applications will be eligible for funding.
- ▶ CA-ESG CV2: Only one (1) grant application shall be submitted per eligible shelter facility.
- ▶ All sections of the application must be filled out and all applicable exhibits
- ▶ Funding may NOT exceed the allowed amount per assigned Tier per application.
