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Geographical Information System (GIS) Tool of the Future!

GIS, is a division of Stanislaus County Public Works Department. Our mission is to provide advanced computer applications through visualization (spatial data) combined with relational databases.

What Are Geographic Information Systems?

GIS, is a powerful and very marketable tool that allows information to be displayed to a location, such as people to an address, crime to a demographic area, aerial's view to a location and then spatially combining critical thinking and problem solving by layering other information to give a better understanding. Classic examples include spatially displaying information for Board of Supervisor Districts, environmental analysis, school attendant district, Assessor information, analyzing social demographic & voting patterns, or

analyzing pollutions within delineated watershed.

Geographic Information Systems are comprised of computer applications that allow you to visualize large amounts of complex, spatial data by creating and combining layers of customized maps. If you can imagine, GIS allows you to wipe a landscape clean of its jumble of topography, rivers, environmental damage, wildlife, streets, buildings, telephone lines, and people, and then add this information back as separate layers in any combination so that you can see patterns and relationships that would have been difficult to notice otherwise.

GIS can mine data from spreadsheets or relational databases, and combine it with visual data such as CAD files, graphics, and images to create "intelligent maps" on which different types of

analysis can be performed.

- Won "Best Innovation" award from 2009 Stanislaus County IT Summer Forum (see bottom left).
- Part of the Third Annual Report Efficient Delivery of Public Services (EDPS).
- Our GIS website has been visited by more than 40 countries from around the world.
- Our GIS website will be used by Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) for their California Counties Information Systems Directors Association (CCISDA) conference in September.

Seymour StaRT to the Rescue

A request for information was received via the StaRT Customer Comment portion of the Stanislaus Regional Transit Website. The request was forwarded to Annette Borrelli, Transit's Staff Services Coordinator. The request came from a 3rd grade school teacher from the Westside of Modesto, Greg Hoagland. He was requesting information relative to a field trip he was contemplating for his class.

Mr. Hoagland was looking for the most efficient and inexpensive way to transport his class from their west Modesto School site to the Stanislaus County Fair in Turlock. Annette contacted him. He wanted to make the trip on August 6th leaving in the morning and returning to school in the early afternoon. She explained his options for the trip via MAX from the school to the transit center in downtown Modesto. From there he could subsequently transfer to StaRT (the County system) to reach the Fairgrounds in Turlock via Express Route #10. They discussed possible return times and she detailed the various locations where his little flock might disembark the bus. Per Annette's calculations, the round trip (including the two transfers) would cost \$55.50 for his 20

students and himself.


Annette advised him to contact MAX to let them know his itinerary. He mentioned that his students were first-time bus riders. Part of his goal was to introduce them to Public Transportation. He said it was part of a unit the class was studying on environmental issues and alternative fuels. Annette explained to him that this was an ideal match since the County operated a fleet of compressed natural gas (CNG) buses and had just purchased 3 new 40' low floor buses which were powered by clean fuel CNG.

She then recommended that he could show his students the County's "How to Ride the Bus Video" which is available for free viewing on the Stanislaus Regional Transit (StaRT) website. He was delighted with the idea and told her he would do that the day before the ride to educate his class. He subsequently checked out the locations in Turlock, came by the office to purchase the tickets in advance and confirm the date and locations. She gave him informational handouts and giveaway items to be given to the class the day after the field trip.

These items feature the mascot for the County Bus System "Seymour StaRT", a cartoon flying bus that operates on clean fuels only.

The following week a huge colorful "THANK YOU" letter on poster paper was delivered to the StaRT office (see below). It was signed by every class member thanking Annette and StaRT for making their trip possible.

"Local Roads Matter" Campaign Launched

The National Association of County Engineers (NACE) launched its "Local Roads Matter" campaign to highlight the importance of "Local Roads" to our nation's transportation system. Over 75% of the roads and bridges in the United States are under local jurisdiction, but national and state transportation funding policies starve them of the resources necessary to maintain a state of good repair and meeting growing mobility needs. The surface transportation authorization provides us with the opportunity to act on these critical issues. NACE President Chris Bauserman, County Engineer, Delaware County Ohio added that "Across the nation, it is difficult for those responsible for the local road system to have a voice at the state level to ensure money is targeted for investment at the local level is actually spent at the local level."

The consequences of this shortsightedness range from an appalling highway safety record to a pervasive negative impact on local and regional economies. A new and more enlightened federal, state, and local partnership is needed to restore the balance to highway investments and achieve important economic, environmental and safety goals. RSTP Overlay Program B Project

This federally funded project consists of resurfacing approximately 26 miles of County roads. Construction of this project consists of placing a 0.23' hot mix asphalt concrete overlay, shoulder preparation and backing placement, and replacement of all roadway striping and markings.

The roads included in this project are Beckwith Road, Hart Road (see photos below), Eastin Road, Marshall Road, River Road, Sycamore Avenue, Villa Manucha Road, Ward Avenue, and Whitmore Avenue.

The overall cost of the project is approximately \$3.3 million and is scheduled for completion by the end of September 2009.

The Transit Division recently received three new Orion VII low-floor buses. The buses were acquired with a combination of Federal and State funds. The low-floor buses will make getting on the bus easier for passengers with limited mobility since the buses can "kneel" down and uses a ramp instead of a lift to get passengers on the bus.

Also, did you know that StaRT ridership has increased greater than the national average for the last five years and ridership has increased 28.56% since 2004?

2009 Annual Road Report Preparation

California Street and Highway Code Section 2151 requires that "on or before the first day of October of each year, the governing body of each county and city shall cause to be made and filed with the Controller a complete report of the expenditures for street or road purposes during the preceding fiscal year ending on the 30th day of June".

This year the preparation of Public Works' Annual Road Report went beautifully. The State Controller office's auditor arrived on August 17th. With him was an auditor-in-training, also from the State Controller's office. The Road Report was completed in just 2 1/2 days.

Public Works staff has been evaluating the processes that are used to provide the necessary information for the Road Report. Resulting changes to CAMS (our Cost Accounting Management System) have really improved our reporting. Information is more accurate, cleaner and quicker to get to.

The state auditors were very impressed with this year's variances. A variance is the difference between what is reported in the financial system compared with the cost accounting system data (actual identified usage by project/activity). The auditors said our variance amounts were so minimal they were virtually unheard of. Acceptable variances are between 5% and 10%. The auditors requested our approval to provide our contact information to other counties for benchmarking purposes! The variances for 2009 are: Labor = 2.29%, Equipment = 1.92%, Overhead = 1.06%, Inventory = 0.03%
